Report on Monday 17th November Stu Schwartz's Travelogue to USA

Stu presented a light-hearted travelogue covering his and Phyllis's trip across the United States during October—early November.

He began by noting contrasts in the American economy: many empty shops and malls, yet luxury events such as the New Jersey steeplechase still thriving. Airports were crowded, travel was busy, and daily life largely normal at street level.

Their journey covered Pennsylvania, New Jersey, North Carolina, Florida, and Puerto Rico. After flight delays and a tense moment with U.S. Customs—where a young border officer nearly denied them entry because they travelled on NZ passports—they finally made Pennsylvania to visit Stu's sister and extended family. They toured historic sites, Amish country, charity shops, apple orchards, and the Mercer tile works.

In New Jersey, they stayed with the mother of Joey—the young man who received Stu's bone marrow in 1992. Now 40, Joey is married with children, and the families remain deeply connected. Stu shared this as one of the emotional highlights of the trip.



From there, they flew to **Raleigh**, **North Carolina**, to visit Phyllis's family. They
reconnected with long-time friends, including
former Palmerston North residents Max and
Esther Scott. They attended the **North Carolina State Fair**, enjoying traditional foods such as *turkey legs*, roasted corn, and maple-syrup cotton

candy, and unexpectedly met someone who knew Stu from his archaeology work decades earlier.

The next stop was **Florida**, where they visited close, long-time friends and Stu's father's grave—something he had not been able to do since 1978.

Finally, they travelled to **San Juan, Puerto Rico**, to spend a week with their daughter and son-in-law. They were delighted to be there when their middle daughter competed in an international opera competition. Stu attended a Rotary meeting in San Juan, where he received a club banner and warm hospitality despite the club facing similar funding challenges to PN Rotary.

He described Puerto Rico's intense heat, chaotic driving, and their reliance on air conditioning—but also the island's beauty, culture, and friendliness. The couple spent time visiting museums, galleries, and Costco, and used wheelchairs at several airports to navigate long distances.

The journey home was long (San Juan → Houston → Auckland → Palmerston North), and Stu acknowledged that because of age, health, and finances—both theirs and their loved ones'—this may be their last major overseas trip.

He closed with humour, gratitude, and reflections on family, kindness, and the joy of reconnecting with people they may never be able to see again.
